

Whether it's as simple as fixing a broken field office door or as complicated as redesigning a drain that's eroding away our trail, Jim always comes through. He's an indispensable part of the Friends of Ballona Wetlands team and a true Friend of the Friends."

Jim grew up along the coast of Southern California and from a young age his family helped instill him with a deep love and respect for the ocean. He reflects,

"I was extremely fortunate to have had the opportunity to travel to wonderful places around the world where my parents would teach my sister and I the importance of respecting the environment and taking personal responsibility for the earth and its fragile ecosystem."

This love and sense of responsibility for nature led him to his career in environmental engineering where he eventually founded EcoKai Environmental, Inc.

Through his work with Dr. Edith Read (a Friends Board Member) during the development of the Ballona Freshwater Marsh, Jim learned about Friends of Ballona Wetlands efforts to protect and restore the wetlands. This resonated with him and for more than a decade, he has volunteered his time, resources, professional knowledge, and skills. With our programs re-opening this year, we could not have accomplished as much as we have without the help of our all-star volunteers! From gardening events, to creek clean ups, to restoration, our volunteers are always the driving force in creating positive change at Ballona Wetlands. The "Gateway to the Wetlands" project, conducted in recent years, is a monumental representation of the hard work our volunteers have put in to our restoration efforts.

The area near the western entrance to the Wetlands was dominated by invasive non-native weeds - some reaching up to 6ft tall. Some intensive restoration work was needed. The Gateway restoration project utilized 1,800 volunteers during 40 volunteer events. Together, we removed 5,433 lbs of invasive plant species, and planted 1,100 native plants!

Now, the first thing visitors see when they enter the wetlands, is a beautiful pathway with native flora and fauna that highlights the natural beauty that makes up the Ballona Wetlands. We continue to work on this area today and have have extended the project east along Culver Blvd. Since October we've removed more than 6 tons of invasive iceplant.

This success story could not have been done without the help of our volunteers. As we continue to open up our programming more and more, you too can get involved with the Friends.
